Remembering Jeanette Tierney



An active member of our community, Jeanette Tierney, who served as a board member of the Spring Harbor Neighborhood Association and president of the Indian Hills Garden Club, died on December 8th



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SHNA Supports Crestwood School Children's Garden

The Spring Harbor Neighborhood Association recently voted to provide support for Crestwood Elementary School's Gardener-in-Residence program. This program provides the school's 360 students with the chance to engage in the production and consumption of healthy food, and participate in enriching outdoor education experiences that support their health and well-being while promoting environmental stewardship.



At a time when children are spending about 1% of their time outdoors, and suffering from the myriad health, emotional and academic consequences of our indoor lifestyles, Crestwood School's outdoor classroom and garden program are enabling teachers to increase student access to healthy and fresh fruits and vegetables, promote student health and well-being, and foster a positive relationship between students and the environment.

Funding provided by the Spring Harbor Neighborhood Association will support a Gardener-in-Residence from Community Ground Works to be on site at the school in the spring, summer and fall semesters to lead garden-based outdoor education sessions with students, and help manage, maintain and improve the school gardens with student participation.

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Well 14 Deals with Rising Salt Levels

City Well 14 at the corner of University
Ave and Flambeau was shut down for two
months in February-March to allow the
Water Utility to take water samples from top
to bottom along its entire 700-foot length.
The Water Utility is trying to determine
whether the upper, middle or lower aquifer
supplies the majority of salt contaminated
water. Sodium and chloride levels in Well 14
have risen steadily over the past 15 years—
believed to be caused by winter road salt
spread on streets, sidewalks and parking lots.

Well 14 draws from a two-level aquifer. The top 200 feet of the aquifer recharges more quickly than the bottom aquifer and is thus more affected by the infiltration of road salt. The lower aquifer feeds through ancient sandstone layers, but has the drawback that it contains higher amounts of iron and possibly manganese.

There is growing evidence that the upper aquifer may also be connected to Spring Harbor, also with a high salt content. Merrill spring, next to the harbor, flows vigorously when Well 14 is shut down, but stops when the pumps are turned back on. It is possible that the spring flows in reverse when the well is pumping causing salty harbor water to be drawn into the well.

Sodium and chloride levels are reaching their maximum. High sodium levels in drinking water are a health concern to the elderly and to heart patients. Sodium levels at Well 14 have reached 42 mg/L—double the level recommended by EPA for persons on sodium restricted diets. Recommended limit is 20 mg/L.

What Are the Friends of Merrill Spring (FMS) Up To?



While winter is a time for rest and rejuvenation for some, hearty folks never stop coming down to enjoy the park and the FMS steering committee has continued to prep for the coming summer season. Here's the latest reckoning:

- On November 12th, a clean-up crew tackled a last cleaning of the park (cistern, streambed, leaves) before winter set in – followed by treats in the park.
- The old kayak rack will be moved and replaced by one matching the others when the weather warms up.
- With Well #14 shut down, the springs are running this winter! Check it out in person, or check out our videos on our facebook page. "The Friends of Merrill Spring". Please like us and follow us.
- There is a temporary barricade preventing vehicular entry due to cars parking and making tracks in the park. Working with the city, we have advocated for a permanent solution a removable bollard which will be installed in the spring.
- Check out the new FMS visitor box on the metal pole at the park and let us know your thoughts about the park!
- Goals for the coming year are (1) decorative stonework around the bollards protecting the wellhead, including a small sign with the Native American name Mąąką' Mąą'í and (2) a very small kiosk set back by the woods which will host the history of the park and other information.

 FMS's long term priority remains a master plan for the park.

Our FMS annual meeting will be held this June in conjunction with our Summer Solstice Celebration. At this time, we'll present our bylaws and the new board. More information later.

Chloride levels now stand at 135 mg/L, more than half of EPA's recommended maximum. High chloride levels make water taste salty and bitter. If these trends continue, the Madison Water Utility projects chloride levels will reach the 250 mg/L limit in about 15 years. Before that time, new water sources must be found.

Well 14 is a high capacity well, key to Madison supply. Well 14 came on line in 1960 delivering more than 2 million gallons of water per day

to Spring Harbor, Hill Farms, Shorewood Hills, and surrounding neighborhoods. When a well like #14 fails, the standard response has been to drill a new well closer to the city periphery. But that also has limits as the aquifers become depleted. Two alternatives have been proposed: draw water from Lake Mendota, or form a metropolitan-wide water district to space out the location of new wells.

Dane County Board Report—District 10 Supervisor Jeremy Levin

I hope this edition of the SHNA newsletter finds you and your family well, enjoying 2017. In November, the Dane County Board of Supervisors approved an operating budget for 2017 of \$587 million, along with a capital budget of about \$50 million. The budget reflects the shared priorities of fairness and equity while always keeping in mind the impact on taxpayers. The 2017 spending plan calls for a 3 percent pay increase for all county workers beginning in January and offers a 2 percent hike for county human services contractors. It also begins the phase-in toward a \$15 an hour minimum wage for all those working for the county by 2022.

The budget includes several initiatives aimed at criminal justice reform and racial equity. Those include:

- Creation of a Community Service Program so offenders can work off their sentence rather than face fines or time in jail. These programs have been shown to provide positive connections in the community so participants are less likely to reoffend.
- Creation of a court mentoring program to help defendants wind their way through the criminal justice system by keeping track of required appointments and appearances.
- Funding for the county-wide expansion of the Community Restorative Court beyond south Madison. The number of cases is expected to grow significantly with the county-wide expansion
- Funding is being considered for a Juvenile Restorative Justice program. Previously funded by grants, the program has shown great promise in getting youths to take responsibility for their actions and repair the damage to individuals or their community.

The Board also added funding for low income residents to participate in Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) programs; money for gardens in communities outside Madison and funding for a pilot program to encourage farmers to become certified organic farmers.

Environmental initiatives added to the budget included doubling the funding for urban water quality grants and funding for a chloride study to determine the impact of winter street salt and salt from water softeners on drinking waters.

The County will also be moving forward on a comprehensive master plan for the Alliant Energy Center (AEC) campus, which are Countyowned facilities. Currently, the AEC is a major generator of economic activity for the region. AEC hosts nearly one million visitors per year, generating 75,000 hotel room nights, \$2.1 million in room taxes and \$87 million of direct spending. Recently, the Board heard a presentation from Hunden Strategic Partners on their firm's 276-page draft market study, which will help develop a vision that will lead to a master plan for Alliant. They suggest renovating the Coliseum, adding two new hotels, expanding the existing Exhibition Hall, building connecting skyways and creating more dining opportunities.

Additionally looking forward in 2017, the County will continue to look at addressing changes to the State's long-term care programs that are being proposed by the State. The County will also look to meet its long-term obligations to protecting inmates by renovating the Public Safety Building and Jail.
