Emerald Ash Borer and Spring Harbor Parks



Last winter the Forestry Section of the City of Madison began marking ash trees in our neighborhood parks and terraces with a yellow dot to signify that the trees will be pre-emptively removed due to the emerald ash borer infestation that is hitting our area. If an ash tree is located in a City Park, is more than 10 inches in diameter, and still in good condition, it is potentially adoptable. Local residents

that are interested in protecting the trees can work with City officials and licensed contractors to chemically treat selected trees.

We've requested adopting several trees in Spring Harbor Park and boat ramp, one tree in Merrill Spring Park, and up to three trees in Indian Hills Park. These trees are key shade trees that we'd hate to lose. Trees already marked with a yellow dot, and also have a blue dot at their bottom means that they are under review by City Parks.

There are neighbors that have expressed interest in adopting a tree or two for chemical treatment. Weed Wrench and Dandelion Pullers

The Indian Hills Garden Club has two Weed Wrenches and two Fiskars Dandelion Pullers for neighborhood residents to use. The weed wrench is useful to remove invasive trees and shrubs from your property. The smaller wrench will remove plants with main stems up to one inch diameter, the other will pull stems up to two inches. Directions are included.

The Dandelion puller will save your back – it is used in a standing position to pull and remove the entire plant. It will also save the environment by not using toxic chemicals to control these weeds.

SHNA Board of Directors' Meetings

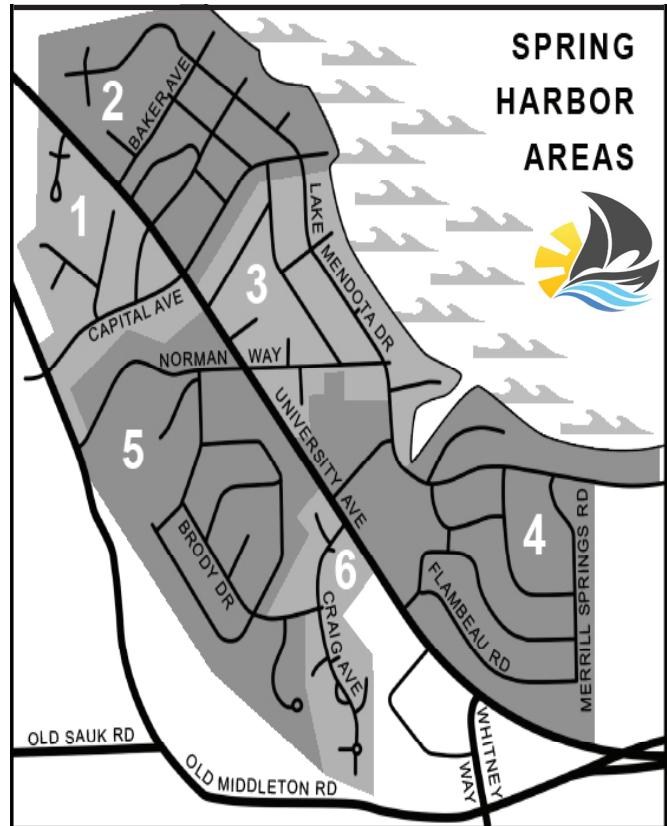

Hill Farms New Super-Sized Office Building

The **new Hill Farms State Office Building** will create a noticeable presence on the neighborhood's south border. When completed, it will stand nine stories tall as a big-box, mostly glass wall on the edge of University Ave. The new structure will be the largest state office building in Wisconsin with one football field of office space on each floor; 600,000 sq.ft. total. An adjoining 8-level parking ramp on Sheboygan Ave is also under construction. It will provide 1,500 parking spaces replacing current surface parking surrounding the DOT building. Future commercial and residential development extending toward Segoe Rd is expected to add an additional 1,000 parking spaces. Neighbors are expressing concerns about traffic congestion in and out of the neighborhood and added buildup of all-day parking on residential streets. That is also expected to spill over into Indian Hills.

The new state office building will house six departments in addition to Transportation—Employee Trust Funds, Dept of Financial Institutions, Commissioner of Insurance, Wis Economic Development Corp, Div of Hearings & Appeals, and Public Service Commission. The PSC building on Whitney Way will be vacated.

Cost of Construction. The new office building, parking ramp and new driveway connection to east-bound Old Middleton Rd will cost approximately \$200 million. The state retains ownership of 7.1 acres of land, about one-third of the current 21 acres of DOT property. The 13.9 acre eastern portion to Segoe Rd, plus 4.4 acres of state property on Badger Rd, were sold to SmithGroupJJR and Gilbane Development, both national companies, for \$13 million to be developed as a private venture called Smith-Gilbane development.

It is anticipated that the Smith-Gilbane project will include a mix of residential, commercial and hotel construction with some high-rise (10 floors max). With the land privately held, it will now be subject to city zoning and planning review. The old transportation building will be torn down and the space used for new development. The farmer's market plans to continue. Community gardens were moved to a small parcel in Rennebohm Park.

Neighborhood Impacts. When Hill Farms construction began, SHNA planners raised immediate questions about possible increases in stormwater drainage into Spring Harbor. The neighborhood was pleased to learn that because University Ave at Midvale is continually subjected to flooding by runoff coming from Hill Farms, a joint flood management agreement was established several years ago involving Madison, Shorewood, and DNR. In the interest of flood control and lake protection, all large scale projects are required to provide surface and underground water infiltration.

Most Hill Farms drainage is east entering Lake Mendota at University Bay on the UW campus. Approximately one acre of the Hill Farms site will drain into Spring Harbor. Part of that drainage will be captured in an underground infiltration tube, plus bio-swales in the loading dock area. The new state office building and parking complex will include underground infiltration systems, silva-cells (special water cells surrounding trees), and biofiltration areas around buildings and plazas. Missing from this project, however, are set-backs for trees and shade, green spaces, and pedestrian-friendly walkways and corridors. Two-thirds of the space is brick and mortar, no provision for pedestrian corridors connecting office workers to the larger community.
