Garlic Mustard Pull Sat, April 24, 9-11am

(Rain date Sunday, April 25th 9-11am)

Garlic mustard is a nasty invasive weed that spreads quickly and takes over our native spring plants. Don't let its heart-shaped leaves and delicate white flowers fool you in to complacency! We meet in Spring Harbor Park. Bags will be provided. Bring garden gloves or any other tools you might want to pull garlic mustard or work in the park gardens. Please consider pulling in Kettle Pond where Garlic Mustard is also rampant. Volunteering is a great way to meet neighbors and take pride in our parks! We also are seeking a new contact for our Planning and Development Committee, which is the committee that often works directly with developers and owners of commercial and residential properties being developed in our neighborhood. If you are interested in helping on the Planning and Development Committee, please contact Aaron. The following are current development projects:

- 5533 Univ Ave - (formerly Brennans) A 200-foot long 4-story mixed use building abutting University Ave. First floor retail, 3-floors residential above with parking underground and in rear. Original building drive-thru was removed. Revised plans reviewed Nov 2018. Demolition & new construction now delayed for second year due to economic slowdown.


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- 5237 Univ Ave - (formerly Perkins) Proposal to build 3 mixed use 4-story buildings with commercial on first floor and residential above. Two buildings across the back of the property and one extending back from the street in current Perkins location with restaurant on the street end. Driveway remains in current location with both surface and underground parking. Owner is awaiting State permit for sewer connection. Demolition to start between May 1 to June 15.
- Spring Creek Box Culvert - Retaining walls at Spring Harbor scheduled for reconstruction early next year. Boat ramp and landscaping will also be upgraded.

I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank Stewart Elison for all his efforts over the past several years to track and report on the development projects in our neighborhood, working with and following up with developers and property owners. Thank you, Stewart!

Lastly, I just want to say that I am looking forward to seeing many of you out and about now that spring has sprung. Gardening at Spring Harbor Middle School



The school gardens are open to the public at all times. The Goodman Greenhouse is open during work days and when school is in session. We have started hundreds of seedlings in the greenhouse in anticipation of spring planting! All are welcome to come and explore, harvest, and take produce when available.

We welcome neighborhood helpers and donations. You can be involved in helping us source materials for our light tables, hydroponics system or motorized compost sifter we're building. I hope this edition of the SHNA newsletter finds you and your family safe and healthy. The Dane County Board continues to meet virtually, passing our first (and hopefully only) budget entirely virtually in November.

At our first meeting of the New Year, the Board heard from Tracy Herold, Director of the Dane County Library Service (DCLS), on library access during the pandemic and resources available to the public. The DCLS is the primary public library service for many residents of Dane County. Director Herold's presentation to the Board touched on library access during the pandemic, how to get a digital library card, and use of the Libby app to get books. Board also passed a resolution that would prohibit discrimination on the basis of protective hairstyles. The resolution was introduced by our State Representative/County Board Supervisor Shelia Stubbs and prohibits discrimination based upon traits historically associated with race, including hair styles.

In March, the Board heard a presentation from John

Welch, Director of Waste and Renewables. The presentation highlighted how Dane County's waste is being used as a resource with an update on the economic and environmental benefits of the Department's work and the Renewable Natural Gas Plant. The department also outlined the timeline for closure of the Rodefild landfill and the vision for a new landfill site that will move Dane County closer to a circular economy.

The Waste and Renewables Department is responsible for the management and operation of Dane County's landfills, renewable natural gas facilities, Clean Sweep, construction and demolition (C&D) recycling facility, and various other recycling programs. Finally, I'm pleased that the Environment, Agriculture & Natural Resources (EANR) Committee, on which I serve, will be addressing the lake level management for the Yahara Chain of Lakes. Following the 2018 flooding, the County took the short-term step to manage the lake levels at State established minimums. Following several quarterly report pre-

sentations by department staff on progress made dealing with flooding and other ways to improve water flow through the system, a recommendation from the Lake Levels Technical Workgroup was made to rescind previous directives to operate at the seasonal minimum, and support giving the Dane County Land & Water Resources Department the flexibility in lake level management. This is something I called for back in mid-2020, recognizing that the Yahara Chain of Lakes offer different users a variety of enjoyment on individual lakes and differing needs and expectations that need to balance the risk of future flooding with an environment for flora and fauna, navigational purposes and recreational activities. My resolution fell victim to some ridiculous politics, and I'm now glad this policy will have the ability to be enacted in time to affect spring lake levels, as that this is the time where lake levels tend to be the lowest coming off winter lake levels.
