This year's Spring Harbor Neighborhood Association spring membership meeting will feature a presentation on "How to Survive!" (University Ave. reconstruction). Also on the agenda are reports from SHNA committee chairs on recent activities and upcoming events. There is a lot going on in our various committees; the new Watch Committee (formally known as the "safety" committee) has applied for a grant with the City of Madison that if won will provide us with the funds to conduct a neighborhood survey of both homeowners and renters and then hire a facilitator to help interpret the survey and find solutions to some of our growing concerns. An ad hoc committee has already compiled various suggestions for what to do with the expansion and a public input meeting will be held in the very near future. On Saturday, May 19, Indian Hills Garden Club members will hold their annual plant sale. We have many different plant varieties for sale at better prices than those at local nurseries and retail stores. For sale will be shade and sun perennials, ground covers, and vegetable and house plants.

Proceeds from the sale benefit neighborhood park projects. This past year, with the city's support, we provided funds to hire a professional team to remove invasive trees and bushes from the area near the ravine woods in Spring Harbor Park. This spring, we are helping to purchase native trees and plants to replace the non-native trees and bushes removed last fall.

The City of Madison Parks budget is tight, so support from the neighborhood at our annual plant sale is crucial to improve our neighborhood parks. We've enjoyed patronage from shoppers from outside the neighborhood in past years but with University Avenue construction, those customer numbers will be down this year. Your support is doubly important to our effort to raise money for park projects. Dane County Board Report-District 10

I hope this edition of the SHNA newsletter finds you well. The decennial reapportionment of the supervisory districts has made the Spring Harbor neighborhood a part of the 10th district. Through these articles, I hope to periodically update you on the activities of the Dane County Board of Supervisors, but as this represents my introductory article, I want first to express my gratitude to you for allowing me the opportunity to serve you on the Dane County Board. Please also note that I am here to offer my assistance to you, to address concerns you may have and answer any questions about county government.

By way of background, I was elected to the County Board in a special election in the fall of 2008 and I have served on the Health and Human Needs (HHN) committee during my entire tenure on the Board and currently serve as its Vice-Chair. The committee's purview is broad, and covers issues ranging from administration of the County's Badger Prairie nursing home, to ensuring adequate and compassionate care for physically and developmentally disabled adults, to the oversight of the county human services department and many other county services. In addition to my service on HHN, I also serve on the Executive Committee, a Committee which deals with many of the functions of the Board and played a role in redistricting.

I am a lifelong Madison area resident, graduating from Madison Memorial High School. I grew-up an All-City League swimmer and played youth hockey. Today, I continue to remain involved in youth sports as a hockey official, and also am a member of the Madison-area Masters water polo team. I live with my wife, Liz, and our dog, Delilah, in the Regent Neighborhood. Professionally, I am the Director of Advocacy for the Rural WI Health Cooperative, a network of 34 rural Wisconsin hospitals.

Neighborhood Watch Grant Proposal

The SHNA Watch Committee has applied for a grant from the City of Madison to fund a survey of neighborhood residents to facilitate a process for identifying and addressing concerns. As part of the application process we asked major stakeholders to support the grant proposal. The following letter was signed by many Spring Harbor area business owners, endorsed by the West Precinct Police, several apartment owners and a condominium association:

This letter is to express our support for the Spring Harbor Neighborhood Association's grant proposal for the "Safe Harbor" project. We believe that it is important for all residents to feel a connection to their neighborhood. An inter-connected community requires a sense of safety, of neighbors watching out for each other, and that the neighborhood cares for each individual. We support the project's effort to connect with residents, landlords and businesses to survey concerns and work together on solutions to improve our community.

If we receive the city planning grant, it will allow us to conduct a thorough survey of home owners and tenants in the neighborhood and pay for a professional facilitator to help us interpret the survey results and plan its implementation. This would be the basis for future grant requests geared toward community building in the neighborhood. If you are in the Spring Harbor email directory, look for a survey to complete after April, provided the grant is awarded. Thank you in advance for your participation.

University Avenue Construction



After years of efforts to fund the construction of University Avenue from Segoe Road to Allen Blvd, the project is finally well underway and is scheduled to continue into October 2012. The project includes pavement, curb and gutter replacement, spot sidewalk replacement, street light, traffic signals, storm and sanitary sewer, water main, pavement marking and replacement of the pedestrian tunnel.

University Avenue will be reduced to one lane of traffic in each direction at all times for the duration of the project. Left turn bays will be maintained at all signalized intersections. Delays are expected during the peak commuting times. Motorists are encouraged to use alternate routes as well as alternate forms of transportation during this project to help ease construction. Access to all business will be maintained at all times during the project. Construction hours are from 7 am to 9 pm.

If you'd like to be kept up to date on the construction progress, you can sign up to receive the City's updates issued approximately every two weeks on its website. Here's how to do it:

1. Once on the City's Web page: <http://www.cityofmadison.com/engineering/universityAvenue/segoeAllen.cfm>, go to the bottom of the page, lower right corner, and click on the 'stay informed...' link.
2. At this screen you either log into your existing account with the City or create a new one. You must have an account on the City of Madison's Web site to receive updates.
3. Once you've created and/or accessed your account, you then need to click on the 'Email Lists' link.
4. Scroll down to 'Transportation Projects', expand that list, and you'll find 'University Ave. Updates' at the bottom.
5. Mark that box and click the 'Update Subscriptions' button at the bottom of the page. You should receive a confirmation email that you are set up. If you do not, try again or contact the Web site's Webmaster per the link at the bottom of each page.

Bi-weekly city staff meetings will be held to provide status and address problems that arise during construction; they are listed on the City's Web site above. Those meetings will give the opportunity to address any issues that may arise. If you have a problem connected with the construction, email the City's project manager Glen Yoerger at gyoerger@cityofMadison.com and/or Mark Clear at District19@cityofMadison.com. Traffic spill-over from the construction project into neighborhood streets is likely to be heavy. We will work to ensure that the city enforces the speed limit on streets likely to gain traffic during the construction period, such as, but not limited to, Lake Mendota Drive, Baker Ave. and Capital Ave.

PLEASE be extra considerate of pedestrians and bicyclists during this time. Getting around is going to be especially difficult for them. We urge you to patronize our neighborhood businesses during the construction period. They'll need our local support during this difficult time for their business (see our Support Our Businesses on page 9).

If needed, the Transportation Committee will schedule meetings to address problems that arise during the construction period. The time and place will be announced via the SHNA email list. You can sign up to receive emails at www.SpringHarborOnline.com.


University Crossing: PHASE II Starting

Building #1 is under construction on University Ave. next to the Spring Harbor Animal Hospital. It will be a 3-story UW-Health clinic with access on University Ave. Parking is behind the clinic in a 225-stall surface parking lot. A new street called University Row will serve the clinic and future buildings. A second street will connect with Whitney Way called Silvertree Run.

Phase II construction consists of a 3-story retail/office building on University Ave., plus 115 apartment units with ground-level retail, all connected to a 340-stall parking garage with a garden roof. Phase II proposals are under review by the city; if approved, construction will begin this summer. [See Ald. Demolition of all buildings/structures on site was completed on March 10. Metal building components were separated and recycled. Concrete slabs, foundations and blocks are being crushed and milled for reuse.

Three groundwater monitoring wells are currently being installed as part of city well #14's aquifer protection plan. MG&E plans to bury its high-voltage power line on the avenue side of the property. The entire 14 acre site is now stripped and bare. Given steep slopes and surface drainage toward Spring Harbor, neighborhood assistance with erosion monitoring is encouraged.

Spring Harbor Natural Resources Update

Invasives, Tree Planting and Bioretention Basins

Many, many thanks to Si Widstrand (parks volunteer) for cutting numerous boxelder from the woods at Spring Harbor Park over the winter and helping us get ready for replanting with native trees and shrubs. Several neighbors helped haul brush to the curbside, including Jim and Hannah Gern, Mark Miller, and Darin Carlyle, and numerous unnamed others (thank you!). We are hoping to get a start at planting new trees and shrubs this spring. In addition, we will be moving forward with City Parks on getting buckthorn removed from the hillside to the east of the dog park. We've alerted the City to existing erosion problems so that they can be addressed during the street reconstruction. We're also working with the City to integrate our plans into the landscaping plans after the street reconstruction is complete.

City Engineering installed two bioretention basins this fall. These are large rain gardens that will help filter stormwater runoff from streets and paths before it enters the lakes. One basin is at Indian Hills Park and the other is next to the Spring Harbor Beach parking lot. We are currently working with City Engineering staff on selecting plants for the basins. We need volunteers to help in a variety of areas with these projects, so please contact Faith Fitzpatrick (faithfitz@sbc-global.net) if interested.

Larger Merrill Spring Park

Last December, City Parks purchased the lot next to Merrill Spring Park through their Parkland Acquisition Funds. This purchase has more than doubled the size of the park. Our alder, Mark Clear, helped to champion the acquisition. Our neighbors Bill Margetis and family made the purchase happen by donating the \$39,000 gap between the ownership trust's final offer and the City's appraised value. Draft recommendations were formulated by the Merrill Spring Restoration Committee and presented to Mark Clear. A public meeting will be held by Mark Clear this spring to discuss plans for the new land and the cottage.



Spring Harbor Watch Committee

While it remains a generally safe and pleasant place to live, the Spring Harbor Neighborhood is experiencing increased criminal activity. Some of our neighbors are frustrated and concerned about the future of our neighborhood. The police are willing to help but can only do so much with limited resources and more challenging problems in other neighborhoods. We as neighbors are personally responsible for paying attention to what happens in our neighborhood and doing something to counteract the problems that are developing. We need to spread the word to others about incidents on our streets, in our yards and to our homes. We need to get organized and help make our neighborhood more safe and secure.

The Spring Harbor Neighborhood Association has formed the Spring Harbor Watch Committee to help organize the neighborhood's efforts to make our community safer and more secure. The Watch Committee is contemplating canvassing the neighborhood to survey neighbors about problems and solutions in the neighborhood, forming a neighborhood watch, and creating an incident database. The Committee is always looking for creative ideas to make this a better neighborhood and volunteers to help make it happen. You can help by volunteering, submitting ideas or just discussing the problems and solutions. There are things we can all do to make this a safer and more secure neighborhood.

Know Your Neighbors-Many people remember how wonderful it was when everyone knew their neighbors and supported each other as a community. The first step in building a safer and more secure neighborhood is to get to know your neighbors.

Improve Security-Steps you can take to improve the security of your home:

- Report suspicious activity, even minor vandalism.
- Turn on front and back porch lights after dark.
- Add motion lights and security cameras.
- Post signs to indicate cameras, neighborhood watch.
- Trim bushes near windows and doors.
- Be a watchful neighbor.

REPORT-People have a tendency not to report incidents to the police. They are often deterred from reporting to the police because they believe the incident is too minor for the police to care about or because the police do not send a patrol car until long after the incident has occurred. REPORT these experiences. Police do care and keep records of reports of all incidents, so as more events are reported, the police are more aware of problems in the neighborhood and can allocate more resources.

No incident is too small.

- People crossing through your yard and broken gates.
- Missing items from your garage.
- Graffiti and litter in the streets.
- Children out in the streets at odd hours.
- Threats or incidents of intimidation.



Don't be afraid to report suspicious activity:

- A stranger loitering in the neighborhood.
- A vehicle cruising the streets repeatedly.
- Someone peering into cars or windows.
- A high-volume of traffic going to and coming from a home on a daily basis.
- People arriving or leaving from homes or businesses at unusual hours.
- People cutting through yards, especially at odd hours during the night.

Things to note

Keep a written log of damaged property from vandalism, observations of suspicious activity, or witnessed instances of intimidation or bad behavior by other people in the neighborhood. Try to note the following:

- Date
- Time
- Observer
- Observation - what happened?
- Physical setting - specific location?
- Any person involved (height, weight, ethnicity, gender, clothing, distinguishing features)
- Any vehicles involved - make, model, type of vehicle and license plate number.

Contact Information

- For immediate emergency concerns, call 911.
- If it is not an emergency, call the Madison Police Department - West District dispatch at (608) 266-4275 and select #6.
