## Indian Hills Garden Club

When we were unable to host our annual group garlic mustard pulls this year, Linda Layman and Kim McBride placed marker flags in Spring Harbor Park delineating 10 x 10 areas and asked individuals to choose a plot and work to clear it of garlic mustard. Many city parks do not have volunteers to pull garlic mustard and it takes over, eventually decimating the native plants. We are fortunate so many individuals volunteer their time in trying to rid this obnoxious plant from our parks. A great big thank you to all who helped in the effort this spring both in Spring Harbor Park and in other public spaces.

## Lussier Center's Support/Solidarity Network

## Weed Wrenches and Dandelion Pullers

The Indian Hills Garden Club purchased two Weed Wrenches and two Fiskars' Dandelion Pullers for neighborhood residents to use. The weed wrench is useful to remove invasive trees and shrubs from your property. The smaller wrench will remove woody plants with main stems up to one inch diameter, the other will pull stems up to two inches. Directions are provided. Both the Weed Wrenches and the Dandelion Pullers will help to save the environment by not using toxic chemicals to control these weeds. spring. This has been a collaborative effort between FMS, Madison Parks and the Ho-Chunk. We've worked with Krause Monument in Reedsburg and have seen the beautiful plaque. Recently, the installer from Viroqua Stone met with us to determine final details before the plaque is mounted and Kyle Metzloff graciously donated his time to powerwash the boulder in prep for the install. Currently the time line is for installation by mid-June. A special thank you to SHNA for their generous donation for this project.

**2020 Budget Summary**

On November 11, Dane County Board of Supervisors approved the 2020 county budget at their meeting. With an operating budget of \$593.7 million, and a capital budget at \$69.6 million, the county's total budget for 2020 is \$663 million.

The proposed budget included \$1.25 million in new funds for mental health services in Dane County, adding to a base budget of over \$60 million. The County Board approved an additional \$1 million for the CJ Tubbs Fund for Hope, Healing, and Recovery designed to enhance community based mental health and addiction services. The Board also allocated \$25,000 to support a position at Outreach, Inc. to provide alcohol and other drug addiction prevention and homelessness in the LGBTQ communities in Dane County.

This budget also prioritizes affordable housing and home-

less prevention services. The County Executive proposed \$3 million for the Affordable Housing Development Fund, and the County Board added \$1 million to this amount. The County Board also included \$1.3 million for the Salvation Army's efforts to develop a mixed use project including a family shelter, a women's shelter, a pay-to-stay shelter, medical respite shelter, supportive service center, and residential housing units on the property on East Washington Avenue in Madison. In addition, the County Board approved a \$1.3 million contribution to the Bayview Foundation redevelopment project.

One post budget item, the County has hired a contractor to begin dredging operations on the Yahara River, specifically to remove bottom sediment in the channel section between Lake Monona and Lake Waubesa. A report on lake levels released earlier in 2019 concluded that removing blockages in the river's main channel was needed to help move water through the Madison chain of lakes more quickly to reduce shoreline flooding.

In a nod to their long-term commitment to look at the intersection of behavioral health and criminal justice, the Dane County Criminal Justice Council (CJC) applied for and has been

awarded a grant from the National Association of Counties. The grant provides Dane County with technical assistance on ways to provide support for individuals with mental illness who also are involved with the criminal justice system. Approaches will focus on a racial and ethnic disparities framework. The grant is funded by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation as a part of the Safety and Justice Challenge, an initiative Dane County has been part of for several years.

Focused on maximizing justice, equity, and the safety of the public, the Criminal Justice Council of Dane County is committed to progress and innovation in all aspects of the criminal justice realm. Engaging national and local experts, the CJC collaborates around criminal justice improvements.

Nationally, it is estimated that 2 million annual jail admissions involve a person with a serious mental illness. In Dane County, 46% of jail inmates received a mental health diagnosis according to the Dane County Behavioral Health Needs Assessment completed in 2019. The County Justice Peer Learning Network will run from January 2020 to June 2021.

## Neighborhood Diversions

We all need entertainment, which are hard to come by with CDC distancing recommendations. Fortunately, we have a few suggestions for both the young and the young at heart.

### Walk/Hopscotch

Yes, Spring Harbor has sidewalks! Area 5, which is across University Avenue—under the tunnel and up the ramp—has a one-mile outer perimeter from Marsha to Lorraine to Dahlen to Temkin.

You can park your stroller and step onto the 0.4 mile **Kettle Pond** path, accessible from Dahlen at Temkin, Dale Drive, and at Norman Way and Old Middleton. Each spring a pair of Sandhill cranes nest there. Evenings and early mornings the frogs will serenade you beautifully, as do the songbirds any time of day. Look for the **Children's Museum** hopscotch installations, which will be coming this summer, near the tunnel ramp, on Capital Avenue and on Craig Avenue. Thanks to Anna Strand, of the Children's Museum, who targeted our neighborhood for these playful learning opportunities.

### The UW-Madison Lakeshore Preserve

A ten minute drive from Spring Harbor, the Lakeshore Preserve has peaceful wooded walking paths along Lake Mendota leading to Picnic Point. You will pass the Eagle Heights Community gardens, beaches, a pond and several scenic overlooks before reaching the Picnic Point path. Park just after the first entrance to the Eagle Heights apartments, at Frautschi Point or near the soccer fields on University Bay Drive.

### Rent a Kayak

If you have your own, the lake access roads between Spring Harbor Park and Baker Avenue give you places to put in on Lake Mendota Drive. If you need to rent a kayak, you can do so at Marshall Park on Allen Boulevard. Check out the Madison Boats website for more information.


