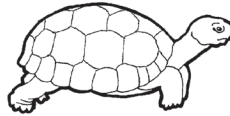

Neighborhood Turtle Garden

This summer, a stone turtle was donated to the Spring Harbor neighborhood by local Girl Scout Troop 2498, led by Carol Quintana, and the Indian Hills Garden Club, with Faith Fitzpatrick leading the effort.

The girl scouts earned \$500 from the last two years of cookie sales and that money, combined with \$42 they raised selling sweets at the May garden club sale, was donated to buy the 500 pound 32 inch stone turtle. The garden club donated the remaining funds needed. Herman Landscaping is also thanked for delivering the turtle and charging less than their normal fee because it was a joint girl scout and garden club project.



The turtle has been placed near the turtle rain garden on the corner of Minocqua Crescent and Lake Mendota Drive. It's a wonderful addition to our neighborhood, and children of all ages will delight in finding it nestled there.

Natural Resources Update Park Vegetation Restoration

With the ravine at Spring Harbor Park cleared of invasive buckthorn, many people can enjoy the views from the new nature path. We hoped to plant some new trees and shrubs and selectively remove some of the overgrown boxelder, but this was put on hold, as the committee members were busy with University Avenue reconstruction and University Crossing meetings.

Plans will be finalized this winter for spring planting. In addition, we will be moving forward with City Parks on getting buckthorn removed from the hillside next to the dog park. The restoration committee is in need of able-bodied volunteers for trail maintenance, spot-removal of invasives, planning, and planting. Please contact Faith Fitzpatrick

Two New Bio-retention Basins

City Engineering received two grants for installing bio-retention basins this fall. These are large rain gardens that will help filter stormwater runoff from streets and paths before it enters the lakes. One basin is currently being installed at Indian Hills Park and the other will be located in the green space by Spring Harbor Beach parking lot. Alder Report

Hello Neighbors,

Here's an update on neighborhood and city issues.

University Avenue Reconstruction: The final plans for University Avenue have been approved, the budget is set, and funding is all but secured. The final hurdle is to ensure funding stays in the 2012 city and county budgets. Construction staging is currently being planned; please watch my city blog (see below) for a public meeting once those plans are complete so we can know what to expect next year. A big thank you to SHNA transportation committee who have worked on this project and advocated for the neighborhood for more than two years. You'll find a link to the final plans on my city Web site.

- **University Crossing:** As of this writing, the redevelopment project at the corner of University and Whitney Way has been approved by the city Plan Commission and is headed for a final vote at the Common Council on October 4. SHNA and other neighbors have been very involved in the review of this project and have influenced the project significantly. Updated plans, meeting schedules and other information about the project is on (you guessed it) my city Web site.
- **Merrill Spring Park Expansion:** The city is negotiating to buy the lot east of the park to expand and preserve the lake shore for the public. The cost would be covered by the parks acquisition fund. I should have more details soon and will share them with the neighborhood. What are your ideas for the park?
- **City Budget:** The city has begun work on our 2012 capital budget, and by the time you read this, the Mayor's proposed operating budget will be released. Due to state aid cuts and the poor economy, the city has no choice but to both raise taxes and reduce services. If that sounds like a lousy deal, it's because it is. One of my spending priorities is economic development activities that are an investment, rather than just an expense. Building our tax base and creating jobs is the only way out of our fiscal troubles. What are your priorities?
- **New Web Tools:** The city has rolled out a new council Web site that is better organized and easier for me to update. I also have a new blog that I'm using as a communication tool to replace my e-mail updates list. University Crossing Development Moving Towards Final Approval

University Crossing on 14 acres of former Erdman property was approved for development by the Madison Plan Commission September 19, 2011. The plan now goes to the City Council on October 4 where final approval is expected. PUD and GDP approvals were granted including clinic building #1 on University Ave and 225 stalls of surface parking. The Plan Commission also approved demolition of all structures on the site—expected to begin this fall—plus construction of an L-shaped street through the property, and a new half-signal intersection on University Ave. The half-signal intersection will be similar to the one at the back of the Target store where Frey St meets Segoe Rd. The Lenhart Company with Krupp Construction is the overall developer.

When University Crossing is completed in 6 to 8 years, it will include three clinic buildings for UW Hospital & Clinics, a retail-office building on the corner of University Ave and Whitney Way, a 6-story hotel on Whitney Way, 3-story hospitality house, and three parking structures, one of which will be 4-stories high and wrapped with 65 apartment units fronting on interior streets. Two of the clinic buildings will be 3-stories, one will be 4-stories tall. The development will generate an estimated 7000 additional trips per day and will be served by the addition of 1300 to 1400 stalls of new parking, mostly in three ramps.

The Spring Harbor development review team with neighborhood support was successful in getting major improvements incorporated into the project.

- Demolition and land grading monitoring were added because of the proximity of the development to city well #14. Requirements will include monitoring for soil contaminants, placement of three ground water test wells, and a public reporting process to make findings available to the city, DNR and neighborhood.
- Siltation basins were called for to limit soil and sediment loss from flowing into Spring Harbor. Steep slopes are to be terraced and planted with deep-rooted long-stem grasses. Existing trees and shrubs on the periphery will be preserved until final construction phases are complete and permanent landscapes are in place.
- Bio-filtration swales were added to help filter parking lot runoff. Plans include the discharge of clean roof water onto tall-grass landscapes beyond the 400 foot wellhead protected area. Grit chambers for street runoff were added. Effective stormwater management calls for keeping contaminated street and parking lot runoff to a minimum. The neighborhood asked for roofs on ramps to increase the amount of clean runoff but the idea was rejected.
- Specific details such as noise control, dark-sky lighting, limits to building heights, unobstructed viewsheds, finished walls on parking ramps, pocket parks, tree buffers along Trillium, and bike/ped connections with Trillium were all discussed and requested, but in most cases, deferred until specific implementation plans (SIPs) are prepared. They are not assured.
- Traffic concerns related to the half-signal intersection, metro stops, pedestrian crossings, and bike connections remain under discussion.

Fall Leaf Reminder

Decaying leaves provide nutrients for the algae in our lakes (algae are the green, stinky aquatic plants that start to plague our lakes in early summer). When placed in the street, nutrients from the leaves can be leached out by rain or snowmelt, wash down the storm sewers and into the lake, "feeding" the algae and causing them to grow rapidly. The leaves themselves don't have to go anywhere. Leaf pickup is one of the City's largest and most costly projects of the entire year.

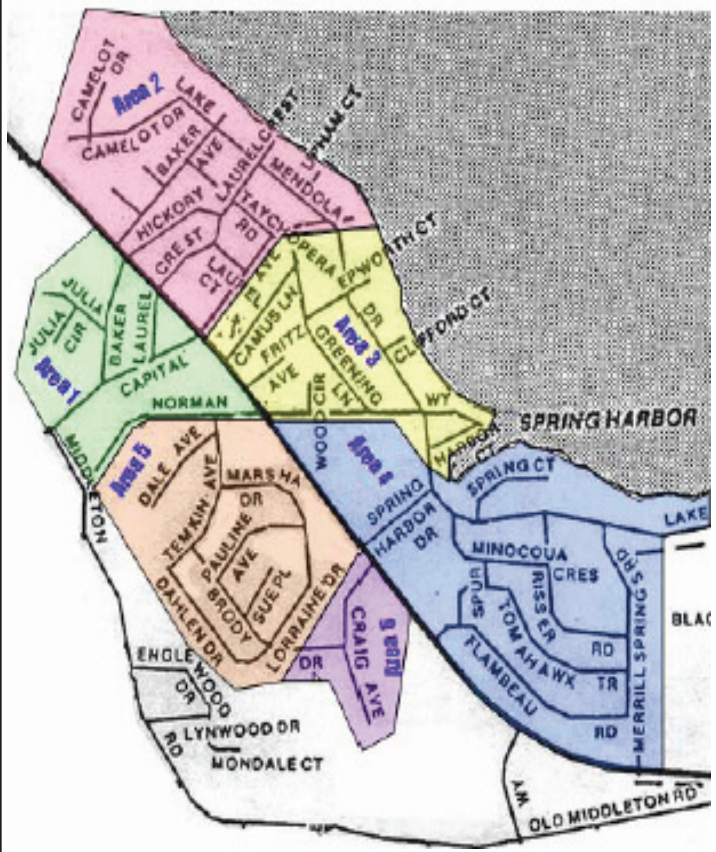

The best way to handle leaves is to simply mulch them into your yard with the mower. The nutrients will ultimately soak into the lawn and give a little free fertilizer to the grass. Raked leaves should be placed on the terrace above the curb and NOT in the street. It is illegal to do so, and is punishable by a stiff fine! Complaints may be forwarded to Al Schumacher, Madison Streets Superintendent at 266-4681 or e-mail at aschumacher@cityofmadison.com. If you must bag your leaves, leave the bag tops open so collection crews can determine what's inside. Leaves also make a wonderful compost for gardening. Do not mix leaves or yard waste with brush as neither will be picked up if mixed. You may place a tarp over your leaves to keep them from blowing around. Pickup crews will leave the tarps. You can check a recorded announcement (267-2088), or visit www.cityofmadison.com/streets to find out when leaf pickup crews will be in your neighborhood.
